








St Peter's Church has been here for over 800 years.

Look around, what can you see?

It was built on a hill. Farmland and fields of sheep surrounded it.







Everyone in our parish is expected to come to this Christian church to worship.



The Nave is where the people sit.

I sit in the pews at the back, the gentry are at the front and the very poor sit on bare, wooden benches down the centre of the aisle.

Imagine you are worshipping on a Sunday and find a pew to sit in. Close your eyes and sense the atmosphere of the church. What does it feel like?

The Chancel is where the priest and the choir sit.







Walk through the archway into the Chancel.

Look how beautiful it is compared to the Nave.

The Stanford family have been the owners of Preston Manor since 1794. Look for memorials with their names on.

Three Sedilia (seats) in the wall are where the priests sat during medieval Mass.

Can you find the crossed keys?
They are the symbol of St Peter.
He has the keys to the gates of Heaven.

I love the way the sun shines through the stained glass windows.





Look for the font where babies of the parish are christened. It is over 400 years old. It was once lost, then rediscovered years later, buried in the grounds of Preston Manor.

Can you find the pulpit, where the priest gives his Sunday Sermon? You can climb up and get a priest's-eye view!

Peak behind the curtains to the tower. The three ropes lead up to the belfry; the bells are rung on Sundays and for special occasions.

Behind the Pulpit are Medieval wall paintings. These are very old and rare; we are lucky to have them surviving in our church.
