Kephri - scarab beetle - god of creation, movement & the sun	Bes - dwarf sticking his tongue out - protected the family, especially children	Horus - little boy - god of the sky and protector and ruler of Egypt
Sehkmnet - woman's body & head of lion - goddess of war	Osiris - mummified pharaoh - god of the dead & ruler of the underworld	Apis - bull - symbolised a king's courage, strength & spirit

Ancient Egypt: the Afterlife

The ancient Egyptians believed that if you were a good person on earth the gods would grant you a happy afterlife when you died. Many people would be buried with small human figures called shabtis, meaning 'answerers'. If called on, these figures had to say 'here I am!' and do work for their owners to make sure their afterlife was even happier!
